Academics at UW-Madison

As an exchange student, you will enroll in courses with degree-seeking UW-Madison students. This will give you the opportunity to experience what it is like to be a student at a U.S. university, as well as get to know students in your classes and campus organizations and build friendships and connections. UW-Madison does not offer any courses exclusively for exchange students.

UW-Madison offers courses in many different fields of study. In addition to taking courses towards degree progress, students frequently take courses outside of their subject/department of choice (known as a major). As an exchange student, you are required to be a full-time student and can enroll in courses in a variety of departments. Most academic areas at UW-Madison are open to exchange students. Depending on your exchange agreement, course access by department may vary. Undergraduate exchange students are expected to enroll in a full time load of 12-18 credits each semester while graduate exchange students are expected to enroll in a full time load of 8-15 credits.

Please note that exchange students are rarely, if ever, allowed to enroll in courses from UW-Madison professional schools (Medicine, Veterinary Medicine, Pharmacy, Nursing, Law, Education, etc).

Housing

On-campus housing through UW-Madison's Division of University Housing is in high demand and cannot be guaranteed. You should be prepared to live off-campus, and there are many private apartments, houses, and co-ops that are close to campus.
